Airmen remembered

AVIANO AIR BASE, Italy - Friends and leaders packed the Caserma Barbarisi Chapel Monday to pay their last respects to two fallen airmen who were deployed supporting Operation Allied Force.

Airman 1st Class John M. Johnson, deployed from the 49th Fighter Wing, Holloman Air Force Base, N.M., and Airman 1st Class Jovan D. Griffin, from the 43rd Airlift Wing, Pope AFB, N.C., were killed Saturday when the automobile they were in crashed on an Italian highway.

Aviano's Ch. (Capt.) Gino Bartmess, deployed Ch. (Maj.) Michael Timmon from Randolph Air Force Base, Texas, and the Canadian padre from the Canadian Contingent Task Force Aviano led the standing room only service in the Italian chapel used by Aviano tent city residents.

Brig. Gen. Dan Leaf, 31st Air Expeditionary Wing commander, asked mourners to carry on the work.

"We can do nothing to undo the loss of these bright young men," Leaf said. "I pray their efforts will not be in vain, but will serve to help bring this operation to a successful conclusion."

F-16 pilot home safe

AVIANO AIR BASE, Italy - The U.S. Air Force F-16 pilot who ejected from his aircraft about 2:20 a.m. this morning over Serbia is back at Aviano with his unit.

The pilot, listed in good condition, is very grateful to everyone involved in his rescue, especially the helicopter and fixed wing aircraft crews that helped in his safe return, and all those who continue to support the Operation Allied Force mission.

During NATO's Operation Allied Force, now in its 40th day, more than 12,000 sorties have been flown without a single pilot lost and with two aircraft losses.

"We're extremely glad to have him back with us," said a 31st Air Expeditionary Wing official. "For the pilot and all of the forces at Aviano, our attention is back on the air campaign."

The accident is under investigation.

F-16CJ pilot shoots down MiG

"It didn't take but a few seconds ... wasn't much of an engagement ... one more MiG-29 gone."

These 16 simple words used by Gen. Wesley Clark, Supreme Allied Commander Europe, Wednesday described a momentous event in the flying career of a Shaw Air Force Base F-16 CJ pilot flying Operation Allied Force missions with Aviano's 31st Air Expeditionary Wing.

"Dog" and his four-ship were on their way to a tanker for air-to-air refueling when they got the message a Serbian MiG was airborne.

"We turned around and intercepted him ... engaged him," the F-16CJ pilot said.

"It felt like it was the top of my personal flying pyramid," the pilot said of the experience. "It was very exhilarating."

After the MiG went down in a ball of flames, the four-ship, badly in need of fuel, re-formed on the tanker.

"(Once at the tanker), I was almost pinching myself because I couldn't believe what had happened had actually just transpired," he said.

With the MiG shoot down still fresh in

his mind, the pilot said the rest of the mission wasn't difficult to complete, but it was "slightly challenging to concentrate on the following strike package that still needed to be supported."

Although alliance forces will never know the true intentions of the MiG pilot, the flight lead, Dog, said, based on the Serbian pilot's maneuvers, "which at time were confusing but also very offensive, we elected to engage him and shoot him down."

At the time of the shoot down, no strike packages were in imminent danger, the pilot said, but based on the MiG's eventual heading, it could have threatened NATO forces.

"What the Serbians were thinking about as far as tactics (when they launched the MiG) I can't speculate," Dog said, "but he was airborne so we engaged him."

The pilot has a very clear view of the events that occurred Tuesday. It was his job to respond to the MiG, as it was the responsibility of the Serbian pilot to respond to the NATO four ship, Dog said.

"I think it was both of our jobs," he said. "Fortunately, we in this fighter squadron in my humble opinion, have the world's finest multi-role aircraft, and we proved it."

New Teen Activity Pamphlet lists all activities going on and who to contact.

The Teen Web Page currently under design by senior James Stewart, will tell you, as well as new teens, what's going on at Aviano.

Youth Sponsorship Program, being launched by the Student Council and Services, will provide sponsor packages to new teens coming to Aviano.

Youth Right Start Program will help inbound teens find out—as soon as they arrive on base—what's available for them.

More Trips, Dances, Retreats, Lock Ins and Teen BBQs (Watch for dates in Teen Scene.)

Sports Clinics and Summer Sports Camps for middle and high school students to be offered this summer by the High School and Services.

New Bowling League, and Pool and Chess Tournaments

Drawing, Painting and Sketching Classes already started at the Arts and Crafts Center.

Teen Talk for middle and high school students already started in March.

Places to Hang Out will be available in the future, but you'll have to please be patient with us. The CAC already has altered their policy to allow teens extended time to use that facility, but a new teen center will be built in the next few years. As you are very aware, real estate at Aviano is extremely hard to come by. Until that center is built though, we'll continue to do our best to make current facilities open to teens.

Window tinting

Q: I've heard rumors that automobiles are not allowed to have their windows tinted, and that the base security forces will ticket and direct people to remove non-factory installed window tinting from their vehicles. Is this true?

A: The base carabinieri have informed me that Italy has an antiterrorism law which prohibits applying non-factory window tinting to vehicles. While the local carabinieri and our base security forces are currently not seeking out American Forces in Italy-plated vehicles with tinted windows, the potential exists for Aviano personnel to be cited off base by Italian officials. In this case, the person who is cited may bring the citation to the 31st Security Forces Squadron police services office, Bldg. 1135. The folks there will work with the base carabinieri to resolve the ticket.



Aviano hitting Milosevic hard

Tremendous precision. Miraculous results in bedding down an expanding force. Selfless dedication and sacrifice. Dramatic and lethal effects on the Serbian military. All these thoughts come to mind as we head into the seventh week of Allied Force combat operations at Aviano. But I think you all know by now what I think of the incredible job all of you are doing. What might not be so clear to many of you is where do we go next, and how do we get there.

Questions I've heard asked include: How long do you think this is going to last? How is the air campaign really going? Are we getting results, and will air power alone win this thing? Are the families and all those deployed here safe? And what about our cover plates?

I can't tell you how long this air campaign will last — the ball is in Mr. Milosevic's court regarding when there might be a halt to the bombing. There is no gray area in terms of what is required for peace. What I will say is that we need to continue to plan for the long term. We need to continue working hard, but we must pace ourselves and ensure we are working smart. You've probably heard it said that this is not a sprint, but a marathon. While our hopes are that this would come to a successful and rapid conclusion, we must be ready for our forces to remain in place for some time to ensure a credible deterrent and incentive for Milosevic to keep any agreements he may sign.

I will also tell you that the mission each of you is doing — and I do mean our entire Aviano team, from our aircrews to our families providing a backbone of support — is having a dramatic effect on Serb military forces. We have destroyed more than three quarters of the country's fuel reserves, we are attacking and immobilizing their forces in the field, and we are decimating their transportation infrastructure to include bridges, railroads and airfields.

Keep in mind that we are fighting this campaign on our terms, not Milosevic's. We have air superiority, and have flown well over 15,000


Allied Force sorties without losing any of our most valued assets, our people, to hostile fire. The Serb air force, on the other hand, learned the hard way on Tuesday that we own their airspace ... splash one MiG-29!

Many pundits, analysts and armchair experts ask whether air power alone will persuade Milosevic to agree to NATO's terms. Time will tell. What is clear is that while some may debate whether air power is decisive, it is certainly definitive. Our air campaign is defining the Serbians' ability to wage war against NATO or the Kosovar-Albanians. Denying the use of their airspace, ensuring their tanks do not have gas, and immobilizing their forces in the air and on the ground shapes the terms for any future military operations or peace negotiations.

As we continue to fight this campaign from a northern Italian base 600 miles from Belgrade, the obvious question arises — how safe are we here, and how safe are our families? Events of the past weekend put a sobering perspective on this issue. I believe we are in more danger of harm coming to our people due to ground accidents than from activists opposed to our mission. The potential for accidents due to fatigue, complacency, and continually operating with a sense of urgency is very great. Ground accidents resulted in 11 deaths during Operation Deliberate Force, the air campaign that led to the Dayton Peace Accords in 1995. Look out for each other and keep safety in the forefront of our minds.

Force protection is still an issue to be taken very seriously. We have had several incidents involving destruction of property and some limited cases of our people being harassed. Be vigilant! Follow the directives we have out there and work to blend in, not stick out. As you know, AFI plates are a hot issue to most of our permanent party members. While AFI plates do not necessarily identify people as military members, they do highlight you as Americans. I have lobbied our chain of command for funded cover plates and hope to have good news for you in the near future.

Again, I thank all of you for the tremendous and professional job you are doing. I am inspired by your efforts and honored to be the 31st Air Expeditionary Wing commander and a member of this great NATO team.

Gen. Shelton visits Aviano AB

AVIANO AIR BASE, Italy -- With NATO's operation Allied Force moving into a second month of air strikes, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Gen. Hugh Shelton visited Aviano Air Base Saturday

to tour facilities and speak to troops.

During his visit here, the general met with 31st Air Expeditionary Wing leaders, had lunch at the Victor Dining Facility with military members, toured a new contin-

gency dorm currently under renovation to make more living space for deployed troops and got a close-up look at operations in Tower Loop.

Although his visit here was fairly short, the general seemed genuinely impressed with what he saw. "I think Aviano is a great example of where you can come and see the superb teamwork by U.S. Air Force, Navy and Marines, pulling together in an example to be emulated by all that are doing joint ops," Shelton said.

He also told a small group of reporters gathered here that NATO wasn't surprised the air campaign is continuing. "There's no real surprise here," Shelton said. "When we went into this campaign, we knew we were going into an environment in which we would have to be prepared to do whatever it took in order for NATO to prevail. We're convinced we can and will do that."

Although many people are speculating on the need for ground troops, the U.S.'s top military man said he's convinced the air campaign is accomplishing the objectives set out for it.

"We plan to stick with the air campaign, we will not be diverted from that," he said.

"Our intention is to prevail, and we are confident that we can do that with the air campaign," the general added.

Weapon crews load "bunker busters"

Weapons troops loaded 4,600-pound GBU-28s on F-15 Strike Eagles April 26 marking the first time "bunker busters" were used in combat by F-15 fighter aircraft.

A four-ship formation of F-15s left Aviano carrying two of the deep penetrating bombs as part of an arsenal of weaponry being used to support NATO's air campaign over the former Republic of Yugoslavia. GBU-28s were last used in combat during Desert Storm.

No weapons loaders at Aviano were qualified to handle the bomb before the decision was made to use it in Operation Allied Force, according to Chief Master Sgt. Steven Hicks, 31st Air Expeditionary Wing Weapons manager.

Hicks said, "a loading standardization crew from RAF Lakenheath, England, was brought in to train the squadron load crew here so the bombs could be loaded before the mission."

Both loading standardization and squadron load crews must be trained and qualified before they can train others. That's where certifiers come in.

"The guys are doing innovative stuff," said Master Sgt. Ricardo Febles, 31st AEW Weapons Standardization. The (Air Force Instruction) says you can certify crews if you have two certifiers there to sign off."

"Eventually, both the loading standardization crew and the squadron load crew were trained and certified on the procedures," Hicks said.

Since there are no GBU-28 training bombs at Aviano, Hicks said, "we also had to get a special waiver to load train with a live

bomb. We'd never seen the operation performed but stepped through the process using the (technical) data."

Since then, the squadron load crew has taught others at Lakenheath's 494th Expeditionary Fighter Squadron.

Part of the training process includes removing the weapon, Hicks said. "But in this case, the F-15 squadron commander stepped in and told the load crew to stop and just leave the bomb on the aircraft. His pilots would take care of that for us."







"We took off with the primary mission of suppressing (surface-to-air missiles) but to suppress air-to-air threats as well, and we showed the flexibility and the training that U.S. and allied pilots have," he said.

The MiG pilot on the other hand was flying one of the higher tech aircraft that the former eastern bloc produced, according to Dog, "and had different results."

The pilot said he saw no indication of any ejection from the MiG.

As with most things, The F-16 pilot said it goes without saying that this was a team effort.

"From getting the jet ready, my crew chief, the weapons and ammo folks making sure I had equipment that worked ... my flight members. Frankly, if my number four man hadn't made the first call that he'd heard (airborne warning and control system) communications, I might not have turned around and gotten that kill. And of course the British AWACS controller got

me there also so it was a team effort from start to finish."

Staff Sgt. Brian Baldwin, the 78th Expeditionary Fighter Squadron crew chief who launched and recovered Dog's fighter, said he was extremely excited to hear about the kill.

"It was a thrill to catch it and see his response," Baldwin said. "He was excited ... I was excited to finally see an F-16 do its job.

"I train for it every day and it made me proud to do my job," the crew chief said.

Staff Sgt. Kenneth Rogers, one of the munitions specialists who helped load the Shaw jet, said he also felt a great deal of job satisfaction when he heard about the shoot down.

"My crew, and another that came down with us, were all in awe," Rogers said. "Everyone came together and when (the pilot) revealed that he'd splashed a MiG, we just lost it ... it was great."

With this and other achievements of NATO forces involved

in Operation Allied Force, Clark said he is convinced the air campaign is achieving the objectives of this operation.

"Yesterday (Yugoslavian President Slobodan Milosevic) launched a MiG-29 in an effort to pursue one of our groups after we departed from a daylight operation over Serbia," the general said. "We picked it up, we turned and we shot it down.

"We have air superiority; Serb planes are being destroyed whenever they challenge us," Clark said. "The air campaign is working and working well. Milosevic is hurting and hurting badly. I know he cannot win and more and more of his forces know it ... And every one of the soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines in Allied Command Europe know it as well."

With the red and yellow star signifying the MiG kill firmly attached to Aircraft 353, Dog said it's back to business.

"I was here today at 2 a.m. supervising," he said. "We've got a war going on."

AF authorizes stop/loss measures

Up to 33,102 reserve component members can be called to active duty for Operation Allied Force under a presidential selected reserve call-up signed April 27 by President Clinton.

The reservists will help increase the tempo of the air campaign over Yugoslavia, Pentagon spokesman Ken Bacon said April 27. They will be based in Budapest, Hungary.

The services are also authorized to invoke stop/loss programs that would suspend service members' normal separation dates from active duty. The Air Force will invoke the stop/loss program; personnel most affected are pilots, air crews, aircraft maintenance personnel and those in other critical specialties.

Air Force Maj. Gen. Susan Pamerleau, director of personnel forces management on the Air Staff, said the service invoked stop/loss as a matter of fairness because of the large number of reservists being called up. She said, however, stop/loss will specifically target those in critical specialties needed for the operation.

Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard officials said their services will not invoke stop/loss.

Cragin said the call-up demonstrates the critical role the reserve components play today. "We really can't do anything from a military operations point of view without the reserves," he said. "The

Guard and Reserve are integral parts of America's total force now and this is just the latest example.

"About 1,500 reservists at any one time support the operations over Yugoslavia," he said. However, the scale of operations has increased, and DoD could not sustain operations without calling the reserves, he noted.

Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve assets include aerial refueling and strategic airlift units, electronic warfare units and some strike units.

Most units called will support air operations against Yugoslavia, though some will support the Kosovar refugee relief effort.

At this time, Army officials said they plan on calling not units, but individuals in such job specialties as civil affairs, psychological operations, water purification and logistics. These Army reserve component members will concentrate on helping the humanitarian mission.

Once called up, reservists qualify for all benefits afforded active duty counterparts, including the tax exemption for service in the Allied Force area of operations.

Some of the reservists will back-fill active duty personnel going to Allied Force, Cragin said. "The United States has worldwide commitments," he said. "These must continue. We are handling all contingencies as they arise. Obviously, this requires an effort by all members of the total force."

DEFENSE MESSAGE SYSTEM

-DMS provides direct writer-to-reader organizational messaging service from the writer's personal computer. Without intermediate handling by the communications center, messages will move more quickly.

-Multimedia options allow writers to attach maps, spreadsheets, word-processor documents and graphics to their messages.

-The user agent will enable users to complete all necessary messaging functions:

- receive
- send
- forward
- retrieve
- browse address directory

-While individual messaging does not require security measures, organizational messaging does, whether classified or unclassified. Users authorized by their commanders to conduct organizational messaging will request a Fortezza crypto card through the communications center, who will review and forward the request to the wing communications security office.

-A Fortezza card is a card that contains a user's private "keys" and security data indicating the authorized classification level. The credit card-sized card provides the security encryption and authentication services employed by DMS.

-DMS encryption ensures the message cannot be decrypted by anyone other than the addressee. Message integrity assures no data has been lost, added or changed. Digital signatures permit the recipient to verify sender authenticity by comparing the "From" name with the digital signature. Guaranteed delivery assures the message reaches the user, while extensive audit trails allow review of a message's delivery path.



Shaw joins fight for freedom

A mission with long days but with a true purpose. That's how 20th Fighter Wing people deployed here view their involvement in NATO's Operation Allied Force.

Approximately 350 people and 24 F-16CJs arrived here three weeks ago in support of the mission.

Shaw's F-16CJs now fly suppression of enemy air defenses sorties over Yugoslavia.

Senior Airman Michael Dorsey, a crew chief deployed here with the 78th Expeditionary Fighter Squadron, is working end-of-runway checks.

Maintenance is about the same here as at home station, Dorsey said, but with more of a sense of urgency because folks aren't just launching the jets for "another training mission."

"We're working with live munitions rather than just training," the senior airman said, "so that makes a difference."

He said most people are excited about the role they're playing in ending the "bloody rampage" of Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic and his forces in Kosovo.

"You want to see your training pay off," Dorsey said, "All year long you train and this is the real thing - it kind of puts you to the test."

Staff Sgt. Byron Barwick, an electronics specialist from Shaw, views this deployment differently as well.

"We have more of a purpose because of what's going on (in Kosovo)," Barwick said.

As maintainers with the 78th EFS launch jets from Aviano, most seem to have only one thing in mind - their safe return.

There is real danger every time a NATO pilot flies over the region.

"Serb forces are shooting at us every day," said Lt. Col. Steven "Yahoo" Searcy, 78th EFS commander.

"It gets the adrenaline flowing and makes you want to do something about it. And the next day we may have a mission that allows us to do that."

There's no better satisfaction for someone who has trained for years to fire missiles than to go out and do that, according to the lieutenant colonel.

With pilots being given real targets on a daily basis, Searcy said he's gotten to see "several happy faces on guys who've shot a HARM at threats. That's really satisfying."

The commander also said pilots can see houses burning from their cockpits as they fly over Kosovo and engage targets of opportunity and enemy forces on the ground.

The SEAD mission of knocking out surface-to-air missile sites and anti-aircraft batteries is instrumental to this NATO mission.

"Our job is to protect the strikers from threats so that they can do the mission," the lieutenant colonel said.

"The Air Force gets fairly real-time feedback on mission success as far as battle damage assessment from the

striker's cockpit video and sometimes we see the results the same evening on CNN."

The results of missions flown by Shaw pilots is less visible, Searcy said, "since we seldom see the HARM missiles on video." According to the commander, HARM missiles are launched from a distance so the impact is rarely caught on tape.

"The important thing is that the surface-to-air missile is shut down or destroyed - either result protects our forces," he said.

"When everyone comes back unharmed, we've done our mission - force protection," Searcy said. "That's our important and satisfying role."

Shifts are long and living conditions aren't ideal here, but morale is generally high, according to Searcy, with everyone at Aviano bending over backwards to help deployed members.

"Clearly (permanent units here) aren't funded or designed to support the additional hundreds of people deployed here," he said, "so living conditions aren't as rosy as you'd like. There's a lot of walking and communal-type living."

"However, as every day passes and the support rolls in, living conditions improve," Searcy said.

Summing up Shaw's involvement in Operation Allied Force, the lieutenant colonel said, "Overall morale is high, the mission is good and it's a pleasant change of atmosphere (from Southwest Asia)."
